Lyndon School Careers and Post 16 Information Sheet

As you begin your final year of study, we believe it is vital you are equipped with the appropriate information, advice and guidance to support you to prepare for your next steps.

We hope that this information sheet together with the school website, @LyndonCareers Twitter account and the termly Careers and Post 16 newsletter will help you to make informed decisions with regards to your progression.

Raising the Participation Age (RPA)

All young people are now required to stay in education or training until at least their 18th birthday. You can choice to study full-time in school, college or with a training provider; full time work or volunteering if combined with part-time education or an apprenticeship.

Any young person who does not achieve a level 4 in Maths and English at school, will have to continue to study these subjects up until the end of their 18th birthday and this will be alongside the above choice of study.

What are my basic options?

FE College	 Offers more vocational courses so suit students who have an idea what sort of careers they want to go into BTEC courses (all levels) T Level courses (new courses from 2020) A Levels (some also offer a limited number of A Levels)
Apprenticeships, Employment or Pre- Apprenticeship/training course	 Apprenticeships - Suit students who are ready to enter employment. Apprenticeships can be competitive so we strongly suggest that students also have a college back-up offer Employment with training/qualifications Opportunities to continue part-time courses or training courses with support in finding apprenticeships

Key questions to ask yourself

- What am I good at?
- Where would I like to be in 5 years?
- What do I need to get me there?

Do plenty of research to ensure you are choosing the right course. Think about what you are good at and enjoy and be realistic with your grade expectations. By choosing the right pathway, you are more likely to be successful in gaining the qualifications that will take you onto your next steps whether this be employment, university or further training.

Remember - whether you go onto further study or an apprenticeship / employment, school will always be asked to provide a school reference so make sure you maintain high attendance, good behaviour and attitude to learning as these are things that will always be looked at before any offers are made.

Course types and levels

These depend on what GCSE qualifications you are likely to achieve.

More about your options

A Levels

A Levels are challenging academic qualifications that prepare students for either university or apprenticeships/employment. Most students select 3 A Level subjects and study these for 2 years with examinations at the end. When picking A Level subjects and combinations, think about subjects that you enjoy and are good at as well as researching any careers that you are considering. Some careers or university courses ask for specific A Level subjects so research is important. You can check out university entry requirements at <u>https://www.ucas.com/</u>

BTECs

BTECs are specialist work-related qualifications. They combine practical learning with subject and theory content. There are many BTEC qualifications to choose from and the levels range from entry level through to professional qualifications at level 7. The highest level for a school leaver is Level 3 and a BTEC Level 3 Extended Diploma is equivalent to 3 A Levels and will enable students to go onto university or apprenticeships. As with A Levels, it is important to do your research and if you are thinking about going to university, check out entry requirements on https://www.ucas.com/

Apprenticeships

An apprenticeship is a real job which combines practical on the job training with study. With an apprenticeship you will be paid a salary and gain a qualification. As an apprentice you will work alongside experienced staff, gain job specific skills and earn a wage and other benefits. You are also given time to study for your qualification. Apprenticeships can, however, be highly competitive so we always suggest that you also apply to college and have a college offer as a back-up.

<u>T Levels</u>

T Levels are new courses that have been developed in collaboration with employers and business so that students learn the skills required by industry and are prepared for work. T levels are a mixture of classroom-based learning and on the job training. These qualifications are relatively new so only a small number of colleges are offering them.

Labour Market Information (LMI)

Local LMI will help you to understand information about the labour market in your area. You can use this information to identify the types of jobs available, future trends, average earnings and the skills and qualifications that you will need to make good and sustainable career decisions.

Did you know that in Birmingham and Solihull, most jobs are in Wholesale and Retail, Health and Social Care, Administration, Education and Manufacturing whereas there are fewer jobs in Mining, Quarrying and Utilities, Real Estate and the Arts and Entertainment?

Growth sectors are Health and Social Care, Life Sciences, Food and Drink Services and Professional and Financial Services.
